H i all and I hope October served up more "Treats" than "Tricks", relative to your DXing efforts. A new "Treat" for many will be the VP6DI (Dulcie Island) QSL for a "New One", which just came out this month. Hope all of "the deserving" got them at least once. Per the OPDX bulletin, there were quite a few "Treats" available, as 243 DX countries were reported active for the week ending 10/25/02. The SFI has been up to 183 this month and as I wrap up this month's column on 10/31/02 the SFI is 170. We are clearly on the downside of the solar cycle, but there should be plenty enough solar juice left for the ARRL 10M contest the second full weekend in December.

On a recent Sunday morning I saw the following internet spots by East Coast stations, within less than an hour: 5B4, 8N1OGA, MU, PY4, TT8 and many Ws and VEs. That could have been a 60 minute <u>W</u>orked <u>All C</u>ontinents (WAC) award, if I needed it and wasn't too lazy to go down to the shack! Actually, I was proud enough of my 5 band WAC to send in for the certificate many years ago. The WAC awards are sponsored by the IARU, if anyone is interested in obtaining a "suitable for framing" certificate (I'm still saving up for my frame – my certificate got a "plastic protector" and push pins, so far).

The CQWW SSB contest is now history and the group at W4MYA's made some FB points for the PVRC, although down from last year. We need operators to make points! About 17 folks had signed up to operate at W4MYA's, but considerably less showed up. The good news was that Lilly provided FB eats (thanks Lilly!) and the 10M and 15M bands were hopping wall to wall once they opened. Per the 3830 early reports, the M/M score at W4MYA was 11.7M as compared to KC1XX at 21.2M and W3LPL @ 19.2M and K4JA's gang at 12.1M in the M/2 category. FB job, Paul and your operators, too!

Fasten your seat belts for the rest of the fall contest season! We have the ARRL SS CW contest the 1st weekend of November, and the ARRL SS SSB the 3rd weekend. The "Mother of All Contests" (in my opinion), the CQWW CW, is the last full weekend of November (does not affect Thanksgiving for the first time in recent history, if I am reading the schedule correctly! - Puck (W4PM), take notice!). For new members trying to get their DX totals up, take note of these DX Band Country (BC) totals of this last CQWW DX SSB Contest by KC1XX, from 80M through 10M: 110, 121, 174, 173, 169. Wow, that's 5 Band DXCC in one weekend! Even with the sunspots down you should be able to make some points for the club this month, as well as pick up some new DX or BCs. Speaking of BCs, remember that our yearly competition for most new BCs and best % increase in needed BCs is coming to an end, with only two months to go. Bruce (W3BP) appears to be the front runner for both, but there may be a dark

horse out there. Roy (WK4Y) has needed some competition for some time and it looks like Bruce is it.

DXploits by Members:

W4TNX: I heard Roy work 3B9FR on 15M SSB about 1800 UTC on Sunday 10/13/2002, so I know WK4Y is still working "GUD DX" (for you SSB operators, that's "Good DX")! After looking at my DX database, I realized I needed 3B9 on 15M SSB, so I worked him also. He wasn't loud, but had excellent ears and I never would have called him if I hadn't heard Roy work him. This is an example of how our "club" relationships work to your benefit. When you know other club member's calls and hear them working DX (or contest multipliers) you can make good judgments as to the probability of your own success. This same day I also worked a TT8 on 15M SSB and 8N10GA (Ogasawara – new BMC) on 15M SSB. On 10/18, I took a vacation day and 12M was hot: new BCs on SSB were 4L7O, ZD7VC, CT3MD, HB9BYZ and on CW, J75EA and OD5/OK1MU; moved to 30M later in the day and got 4J0R and J75EA. At the end of the month I worked VP2MET and D44TT for new BCs on 30M and 8N10GA on 10M CW & SSB.

Tony (KC4AUF) snagged SU1SK on 10/19 for #314. Looks like Honor Roll is just around the corner. Tony also concentrated on new DX in the recent CQWW SSB contest and got 36 new band countries on 10M/15M/20M, including the following 4 **New Ones:** TY3M, MU2C, J49Z and 5U7JK. Way to go Tony and BTW Becky (KS4RX), is Tony "hogging" the rig?

Ed (NW4V) reports that he now has 388 new BCs for the year, including 52 all time **New Ones**. This brings his totals up to 257 worked and 242 confirmed. In October, Ed had 7 **New Ones**: 10M CW = TT, 12M SSB = TJ, 15M SSB = ZK2, 20M CW = FO/M, EZ, ZL7, 20M SSB = CE0Z. Highlights were ZL7C on 8 bands and HP3XBH for #100 on 40M. Good going Ed and a FB QSL/QSO ratio!

Ronnie (WU4G) found time to hunt some DX in-between job searches: SO7L on 20M SSB and ZL7C on 20M CW. We wish you the best in the job hunt Ronnie!

Roy's (WK4Y) yearly BC totals are up to 229 for 2003, with 20 new BC in October, including new BCs on all HF bands except 80M. October pelts include: 160M J75, 40M 5H3 & ZC4 with both on CW, 30M TT8 & ZA (CW – of course!), 20M TY and 9M6 on SSB, 17M 7Q7 CW & TY3M SSB, 15M 3B9FR on SSB, 12M 4U1ITU, R1ANF, 9Y4, TZ8, & TY3 on CW & AH9 on SSB, 10M T88 CW & TY0T on SSB. Good going Roy and a benchmark for others to shoot for next year!

Bob (W4DR) didn't have any new "happy dance" BCs, but did get 22 new RTTY mode countries to reach 136. Some of the better RTTY catches were: 8N1OGA, OH0TV, YK1AO, OD5PL, 5H1HS, SO7L, 5R8FU, UK9AA, ZL7C, T2DX, VP2MPA and K8T (KH8). Bob noted that Dennis (N4DEN) beat him out in a pile-up for 5R8FU on 10M, but later, Bob worked the 5R8 on 10 bands (maybe a first between 5R8 and the USA)! Other highlights from our prez included getting a P5 QSL for 10M and working XX9C on 40M SSB from W4MYA's (a BMC 'DR needs from his own QTH).

Upcoming (& ongoing) DX of Interest:

P5/4L4FN must be taking a break, as I haven't seen any spots recently - hope he comes back

soon! I have been seeing some spots for P5T and P51DX, but I don't know what their official DXCC status is and I haven't heard them myself. YAs are still showing up on internet spots, also. 8N10GA (Ogasawara) will be back on the air 10/26–11/4 and F05RIC (Australs) from 10/27–11/8. 3XY7C (Guinea) will be QRV by DLs from 10/30 thru 11/13 and 9L1AB (Sierra Leone) from 11/7 thru 12/5. VK0MQI (Maquarie Island) is scheduled to be there through 11/30, although he hasn't been spotted the last few weeks. 9N1HA (Nepal) has been somewhat active on 10M lately from 0900 to 1400 UTC. As always, when conditions "feel right", you can call CQ DX and see what's biting (like tossing a fishing lure into the water) - you may get a surprise! I guess mentioning the 9N1 triggered my memory, as a 9N7 answered "CQ DX" for my # 331 DXCC CW on 20M 2 years ago (and to make my day, he had a USA QSL manager – W4FOA, who was quick!). I also remember an SV5 answering my "CQ DX" on 40M CW many years ago for my # 100 DXCC on that band.

New QRP DX Rigs:

Just kidding about the "DX" part, but I have a penchant for QRP challenges and that is the only way I can work this into my column! I just happened to look at the ICOM website the other day and noticed they have a new rig out called the IC-703. It is patterned after their very popular IC-706xx series, but with only HF and 6M at up to 10 watts, adjustable. The rig has not been "type accepted" by the FCC yet, so there is no pricing information, but I would assume it will be competitive with high end QRP kits like the Elecraft K-2 + a couple hundred bucks for the "sweat equity" of building a kit. Not to be outdone by ICOM, I saw in

the latest QST where Ten-Tec has come out with the Argonaut V rig, adjustable 1 to 20 watts, without 6M, but with PSK31, for \$795. QRP has been very popular the past few years, during the solar peak. Either rig would be a neat "stocking stuffer" for any of you that haven't finished Christmas shopping for me! Deliveries will be accepted at the CVCC December dinner meeting at the "Steak and Ale".

Editor's note: As this month's profile, we would like to feature Bob Morris, W4MYA, by way of presenting the draft of a letter nominating Bob to the CQ Hall of Fame. Bob has contributed so much to CVCC and PVRC over the years, and well deserves to be honored.

Subject: Nomination of Bob Morris (W4MYA) to the CQ Contest Hall of Fame

Dear Bob,

It is with great pleasure and pride that I submit this nomination to the CQ Contest Hall of Fame for one of our members, Bob Morris, W4MYA. Bob has been a tremendous asset to the Potomac Valley Radio Club (PVRC) for several years by contributing to our club contest scores, recruiting new members and serving as a trustee on the board of directors.

Bob was first licensed as KN8NNC in West Virginia at the age of 12 in 1958 while pursuing a Boy Scout merit badge. His "Elmer" was his Dad, who was the ScoutMaster and became KN8NND (now SK). In 1959, Bob's Dad was transferred to Richmond and shortly thereafter, Bob passed his Conditional exam at age 13, becoming W4MYA in 1959. Incentive licensing necessitated upgrading, but Bob kept the now well known "<u>M</u>onoband <u>Y</u>agi <u>A</u>ntenna" callsign.

Bob had a thirty-five year career with AT&T, which allowed him to stay in the Richmond, Virginia area, even though he changed job descriptions many times as he advanced. The last few working years allowed him to travel and meet fellow contesters from DE, Northern Va. and NC. Bob's transition to contesting occurred in 1969 when he met Jack Reichart (now N4RV). Jack was in Engineering at AT&T and Bob was in Maintenance. Jack invited Bob to operate with him on 20-meters at W3MSK (W3AU). After that experience the seed for big-station big-time contesting was planted. The operators at W3MSK included: W3AZD (10M), K3EST (15M), N4RV (20M), W3TMZ (40M), K3ZO (80M), and W4IN (160M). Bob certainly entered the contesting world in good company!

In the 1970s, operating was limited to low power and wire antennas. Operating skills were developed by handling traffic in Navy MARS as N0KOH. Bob also made contacts in many of the SS contests and although these were not "serious" efforts, they kept his future contesting vision in sight. One memorable score from this decade as a guest operator:

1977 W4DR CQWW SSB M/S #1 W4

The Central Virginia Contest Club (CVCC) was formed in the 1980's. Bob guest operated from the QTHs of KX4S and W4DR in those days and was a significant contributor to their scores, while mostly operating M/S with a couple of tries at M/M. Bob always had the highest rates, put in the longest hours, scored the most points and had the most fun. His enthusiasm and coaching has helped others score more points and improve their operating skills.

Bob's first ever tower went up in 1985 with a 3EL 20M and a duobander for 10/15M at 55 feet. Many SS contests were worked from home. The CVCC was the ARRL #1 Local Contesting Club in 1979, 80, 83, 84 and 85 and was #2 in 1981 and 1982. Scores from the 1980's, mostly as a guest operator:

In the 1990s (actually starting in December of 1989), the seed planted in 1969 started to grow. Bob started working on his own M/M station on 5 acres in Western Goochland County, Virginia and has achieved startling results on a yeoman's budget. His contest QTH has grown to 7 towers. Most of the equipment has been purchased second hand or surplus, donated, or scrounged. For the most part, "sweat equity" built this station. The reason Bob has been able to secure the "sweat equity" is that he is such a generous station owner with respect to allowing new contesters "chair time" and providing mentoring and coaching in the contests. He has also been very accommodating assisting other stations in the local and state area with consultation and "sweat equity" in building their stations, with the goal of improving regional and club scores and activity in contesting.

In addition to building a "super station" on a budget and being a first class "good guy" by helping other state and regional stations, the theme of this nomination is threefold:

• Bob is a world class contester in his own right on both CW and SSB as evidenced by his many individual #1 (and top 10) contest scores, including these selected major ones, spanning the last 10 years:

Bob is also very comfortable at 35-40 WPM CW and could give anyone a run for their money in this mode.

• Bob is a team player who contributes maximum scores to the PVRC as a M/M, when he could easily get more personal recognition as a M/S, M/2 or single operator. Some significant scores from recent history:

The PVRC has an award called the "5 Million Award" which recognizes contest activity and dedication to the club. This award was started in 1997. Bob now has 40.2M points and is #3 in the club standings, only behind K3MM (43.6M) and K3ZO (40.6M & Contest HOF member). W3LPL (26.4M & Contest HOF member) is #9, for reference purposes. This past year, Bob contributed the most points to the PVRC by a significant margin (K3MM @ 6.9M, K3ZO @ 8.4M and W4MYA @ 9.6M). This pace would easily put Bob in the lead next year.

It is important to note that Bob enters many contests, not just the major ones. Bob enters VHF contests as well as contests of organizations other than CQ/ARRL/IARU. In fact, the Virginia QSO Party record is currently held by W4MYA and he has found that this, as well as Field Day, is an excellent training opportunity for the next generation of new contesters. This is a good lead-in to the next bullet point.

• Bob is a recruiter of contesters and has the patience to train, coach and mentor them.

Bob championed the partnership of the CVCC with the PVRC in 1995. This helped the resurgence of the PVRC as a major contesting club. Although a relatively small club, the CVCC has 2 members in the top 20 PVRC 5M scores and 8 members in the top 75. The CVCC had an increase of 14 (a 34% increase, 41 to 55) members during this past contest season, owing in a large part to the generosity of Bob allowing new members to have "chair time" in the WPX SSB, Va. QSO Party and Field Day. In this day of a declining ham population, I think the aforementioned increase is fantastic and is largely attributable to Bob.

Although not directly contest related, I will add that Bob's contest station is widely respected for it's reliable communications abilities and he has made it available for ARES activities in Virginia. On September 11, 2001, the station was the ARES Net control for activities on both 80 and 40M as conditions changed. There have been 2 different ARES drills in 2002, during both of which the station was used on 2, 40 and 80M. He has offered the station to Virginia ARES anytime they deem it necessary.


I feel the above credentials, spanning more than three decades of contesting, are more than adequate to admit Bob into the CQ Contest Hall of Fame and certainly hope you and the admissions committee feel the same way.




