It's all about rate, or is it?

Rate this! Yes its about rate but the fastest operator usually isn't the winner in every contest. When it comes to rate it about sitting on a frequency running stations fast but also as accurate as possible. Its very important to log what is right and not say oh well the log checkers will get it. And most likely they will and cost you penalty points removed from your log. Ouch!

So you don't think you're a runner and prefer to search and pounce (S&P). My goal has always been to work 60 stations and hour or 1 per minute. Sounds easy doesn't it? Give it try and set a baseline to improve on. 60 an hour is a good rate and if consistent keep up the motivation and you're be a winner!

Choosing the right category can make a difference if you're planning to win. If serious about winning then maximize your time by improving your skills.

The single biggest weapon for a small pistol is persistence. If you give up when the time between Qs stretches out to 4, 6, 10, or more minutes, you give up your competitiveness.

At a rate of 60 Qs/hour, you would work 2,880 stations in a 48-hour contest.

At 30/hour, that's 1,440 stations in a 48-hour contest.

Even a rate of 15/hour (only one QSO every 4 minutes!), you'd still work 720 stations in 48 hours!

Winning is fun!

What's UBN?

After the contest the log checkers will remove QSO's copied bad (-B) or not found in the other log (NIL). This can cost you valuable points so accuracy is one key to winning.

(U)nique - not found in other logs, no points removed.

(-B)ad - copied call or report wrong, points removed.

(-NIL) - not in other person's log, points removed.

So you can see that's it very important to be accurate as small mistakes can add up to big points. If you look WA4PGM made 2762 Q's and busted 34 of them for an error rate of 1.23%

We lost a total of 869,031 points from 101 Q's, 3 countries, and no zones. Final score 13,560,678 good for 4th place World Multi–Single.

N₁MM

NIMM is probably the most popular freeware program designed mainly for contest logging. Although it will work for some general logging it doesn't come with award tracking. There is a very active Yahoo Group for NIMM that offers technical support and the program is always being updated from user request.

All major HF <u>Contests</u> are supported including General DX logging, DXpedition, DXSatellit and VHFdx.

Radio <u>interface</u> to <u>support radios</u> from Kenwood, many Yaesu (for example: FT-1000, FT-1000MP, FT-990, FT-920 and more), Icom, Ten-Tec Orion and Elecraft.

Uses sound card for <u>DVK</u> but also DVK interface for W9XT & other DVK's.



QSO B4?

After reading up about the UBN file and it's purpose you might have a question should you work dupes when running? Yes by all means work the station. You shouldn't refuse a contact from a station. For some reason that person is calling you, either they busted the first contact or logged it incorrectly.

Besides they're NO penalty points for DUPES and it takes less time to work the station than it does to explain the first contact. Besides you might not be in their log. If so, and they submit the log, you're lose points by not working them.



What is "running"? - by ZSIAN

When a station can stay on one frequency calling CQ and working station after station, this is known as "running". If you can do it then it is a very effective way to make lots of QSOs, although often they will be from the same area so you may not accumulate as many multipliers as you could if you were "searching and pouncing" on needed multipliers. In order to "run" successfully, you need either to have a good signal, or to be a moderately rare multiplier, in order to attract sufficient callers and hold on to your frequency. You also need to be fairly competent at recognizing callsigns, whether CW or Phone, which may be buried in pile-up. Nobody minds if you take 4 or 5 tries to figure out the callsign of a station when you are search and pouncing and the other station is calling CQ, since you can just listen to his or her CQ call 4 or 5 times without disturbing anyone, and only your own score will suffer. However if you call CQ and then take four or five attempts to get the callsign of the station coming back to you correct, then you had better be a very rare multiplier!

What is "search and pounce"? - by ZSIAN

Search and Pounce (S&P) means tuning around the band listening for stations calling CQ (or "TEST" as the case may be) and then calling them. It is the easiest way of operating for a beginner, as you can take your time to copy the callsign if necessary without any pressure (except the knowledge that time is points).

Depending on band conditions, it may be worthwhile calling everyone you hear, or you may only want to call multipliers that you have not worked already. In either case, listen for the weaker signals that might get lost next to the strong stations (a narrow filter can do wonders), to make sure you don't miss out on a valuable multiplier just because there was a string local station 500 Hz away.

Run or S&P?

I spend about 60 percent of my time doing S&P. This can be very productive time as far as the club score is concerned especially. I keep track of my rate and when it drops below 40 per hour, its time to run for a while.

My S&P strategy is to start at the bottom of the band and work my to the top. Set a goal for yourself and don't waste a lot of time trying to work stations. After a couple calls put that frequency in memory or mark the band map and move on.

While working stations always be looking for a clear

frequency to run. Hopefully you can get some stations calling and your rate will improve, once the rate drops below 30 it might be time to S&P again or change bands.

If you're a S&P operator start at the bottom and work the strong stations while tuning all the band. If several bands are open change bands and repeat the process. Remembering your goal and not wasting time calling stations over and over.

A lot of low profile contesters might be intimi-

dated by calling CQ. You shouldn't be afraid I've worked a lot of multipliers from my CQs and this is always a lot of fun.

Reginald Fessenden

During my trip last November I found out that Reginald Fessenden the person who made the first voice broadcast was laid to rest in Bermuda. Fessenden was a professor at the Whitley Institute near Flatts Village at the age of 18. I decided my next trip I would pay my respects to the person well known for many achievements in radio.

Reginald Aubrey Fessenden (October 6, 1866 – July 22, 1932) was a Canadian inventor, best known for his work in early radio. Three of his most notable achievements include: the first audio transmission by radio (1900), the first two-way transatlantic radio transmission (1906), and the first radio broadcast of entertainment and music (1906).



2007 CQWW DX Contest

RTTY: September 29-30 — Phone: October 28-29 — CW: November 25-26 Starts 0000 GMT Saturday - Ends 2400 GMT Sunday

Condensed rules for full details see: http://www.cqww.com

OBJECTIVE: For amateurs around the world to contact other amateurs in as many zones and countries as possible.

BANDS: All bands, I.8 through 28 MHz, except for WARC bands.

NUMBER EXCHANGE: Phone: RS report plus zone (i.e., 5705). CW: RST report plus zone (i.e., 57905).

POINTS:

1. Contacts between stations on different continents are worth three (3) points.

2. Contacts between stations on the same continent but different countries, one (I) point. Exception: For North American stations only, contacts between stations within the North American boundaries count two (2) points.

3. Contacts between stations in the same country are permitted for zone or country multiplier credit but have zero (0)point value.

SCORING: All stations: the final score is the result of the total QSO points multiplied by the sum of your zone and country multipliers.

Example: 1000 QSO points X 100 multiplier (30 Zones + 70 Countries) = 100,000 (final score).

CLUB COMPETITION:

1. The club must be a local group and not a national organization.

2. Participation is limited to members operating within a local geographic area defined as within a 275 km radius from center of club area (except for DXpeditions specially organized for operation in the contest; club contributions of DXpedition scores are percentaged to the number of club members on the DXpedition).

3. To be listed, a minimum of 3 logs must be received from a club, and an officer of the club must submit a list of participating members and their scores, both on phone and CW.

LOG INSTRUCTIONS:

- I. All times must be in GMT.
- 2. All sent and received exchanges are to be logged.
- 3. Indicate zone and country multiplier only the FIRST TIME it is worked on each band.
- 4. Logs must be checked for duplicate contacts, correct QSO points, and multipliers.
- 5. We want your electronic log. The Committee **requires** an electronic log for any possible high-scoring log. By submitting a potential high-scoring log to the CQ WW Contest, the entrant agrees to have the log open to the public.

E-MAIL Required Content: Please submit your log in the Cabrillo file format created by all major logging programs. Be sure to put the STATION CALLSIGN and the MODE in the "Subject:" line of each message. Your software may automatically encode your log as an attachment. Your e-mail log will automatically be acknowledged by the server. You will also receive a personal access code from the server. Submit your CQ WW RTTY log to rtty@cqww.com and CQ WW SSB log to ssb@cqww.com and your CQ WW CW log to ccw@cqww.com
