2320 Huguenot Trail is on the right and is approx. 2 miles past Lucky's service station

**Directions from Goochland Courthouse (Route 6 and Rt. 522)

Go South on Rt. 522. Cross the James River.

Go East (Left) on Huguenot Trail (Rt. 711) approx. 5.5 miles 2320 is on your Left and approx. 1 mile from Lee's Landing Road.

**Directions from Rt. 60 and Rt. 522

Go North on Rt. 522 to Rt. 711. Go East (Right) on Huguenot Trail (Rt. 711) approx. 5.5 miles.

2320 is on your Left and approx. 1 mile from Lee's Landing Road.

There are some interesting ones this month, which I've shown in bold. The CQWW WPX can yield a lot of QSO's and although while I don't see much sense in counting prefixes for multipliers, you may be able to find a few new B/E's in this one too. The CQ-M is a nice DX contest sponsored by the Soyuz Radiolyubitelei Rossii (SRR) or Russian Amateur Radio Union. Also there are some fun QSO parties and even a 6-meter sprint. Give them a try!

I added the FOC BWQP to the calendar. It's interesting that most contest calendars never will publish FOC events. The BWQP's, which occur twice each year, are open to all and have a lot more participation than some of the obscure ones that do make the calendars. See the BWQP info below.

The June Bill Windle QSO Party

The Event: The Bill Windle QSO Party. Stations call CQ BW **Duration:** 24 hours. 0000Z to 2359Z on Saturday, 23 May 2009.

Object:

FOC members: To make as many different QSOs as possible. VHF bands are included but WARC bands are excluded. Members are encouraged to work as many members and non-members as possible to promote operating on CW. This also provides an opportunity to hear the operating practices of others who may be considered for nomination in the future.

Non-Members: To contact as many FOC members as possible on all amateur bands including VHF. However, the WARC bands are excluded.

Exchange: For FOC members: RST, Name, & FOC Number. For Non-members: RST & Name.

This is the minimum info to exchange. Everyone is encouraged to have at least a mini-chat with other stations.

Frequencies: CW portions of all appropriate bands, from 015 to 040. Top Band: Avoid the DX Window

Activity Report: FOC members report total QSOs and total FOC QSOs, counted once per band. For example: 302/177 would indicate a score where the first number would be total QSOs, followed by the total FOC member QSOs. Non-Members report total QSOs with FOC members, counted once per band.

Awards: Handsome certificates will be awarded to the station on each continent reporting the highest number of QSOs. Certificates will be awarded in both categories, members and non-members. No logs, no verification required; we are only using the honor system. Send your report to KZ5D@aol.com no later than 30 May 2009. Final results will be posted on the open page of our FOC website and published in the FOC News Sheet. A complete wrap-up will appear in Focus. Member QSOs that qualify can count for the Bill Windle award, Augie, WAFOC, WAS-FOC, etc.

In addition Field Day 2009 plans were discussed, as were CVCC plans for entering contests as a local club this coming year, membership, and a proposal for a new annual CVCC contesting award.

DX de DR (April Reports):

With only one major DXpedition this past month the bands have been pretty quiet. The Mellish Reef operation was really unique. It was done by two men furnishing their own transportation. They were dedicated 160 meter operators and made no apology for spending lots of time on that band. In spite of this many other QSO's were made on all of the other bands. They fought extremely bad weather going and coming as well as during their time on the tiny island. Despite all of these problems and without any support staff they got out a consistently good signal on 160 which is the hardest band to get up a good transmitting antenna where there are no towers or tall trees. The small size of the island also challenged them to put up efficient receiving antennas. Yet despite all of

these disadvantages they did themselves proud giving a new one to many top band operators as well as to lots of the deserving on other bands. Congratulations to AA7JV and HA7RY. Let's see if we can get them to put India on top band, a much rarer country for NA topbanders and much more accessible.

I just read that the USFWS people were very happy with their experience with the amateur radio team which took them to Desecheo. The team left the island in better shape than they found it. This bodes well for future operations from US territory controlled by the USFWS such as Navassa Island. It does make the point that working cooperatively with a powerful government agency is probably more effective than fighting them in court. K4UEE, W0GJ and NA5U deserve much of the credit for making this approach work and for making future ventures possible. If Desecheo was expensive it will pale compared to the cost of putting on a similar operation from Navassa where the nearest US controlled territory is over 100 miles distance and it ruled by the US military. In the meantime another USFWS territory should be on the air this summer, Midway Island, KH4.

INDIVIDUAL REPORTS:

N3UA: Sejo got TL0A on 17 and 20 for an all time new one. Also 5X on 40 and C31 on 30 were new B/E's. He also spent a few hours in the FL and GA QP's as well as the SP DX contest.

KF7NN: George, along with W4MYA, has started a new business, VETEX, to repair radios and computers. This is great news for us, as we will no longer have to send our rigs all over the country to get them repaired. Let's support our friends and fellow club members in this venture and urge others to do the same. My FT1000 is headed over there tomorrow.

KC4AUF: Tony has added another hobby to his growing collection. He has taken up aviation. Several ham buddies are teaching him to fly. He is still elmering new hams and intends to put on a FD operation from his church grounds. Another project is to establish a regular contact with a DU station to stay in contact with a missionary friend. That will be tough with the poor HF conditions we have.

W4PM: Puck has been busy refinishing floors and painting his old QTH. Is a move back there in the works? Despite this he still found time for 306 QSO's most of which were made in 3 contests. C91TX was a new B/E on 17 and VK9GMW was all time new on 30.

WK4Y: I had the privilege of visiting Roy's impressive shack last week. It was so neat and professional looking that I felt a pang of guilt about my messy collection of wires and cables. The antennas were also equally neat and well engineered and the lawn didn't have a single weed in it. His present project is a full sized 40 meter vertical with an extensive ground system. He will probably make use of that ground for a 80 meter wire vertical and perhaps even a 160 meter inverted L. Oh yes he did work TL0A on 17 for a new one.

W4DR: I had one particularly good morning on 160 working VK9GMW, VK9LA and JH4IFF all with good signals. A direct QSL from EX2A for 160 was a welcome addition to my collection as was a 60 meter card from KH6MB.

Propagation expert K9LA is asking how this present sunspot minimum has compared to the past several minimums on the low bands and especially on 160. My own very unscientific take on this is that the paths to Asia have almost always been over the North Pole and that they have been unusually good. On the other hand, I haven't worked any long haul Asian/Indian Ocean DX via the SSW path in the morning or in the late afternoons via the SSE path for a long time.
