As you can see we need more help during the planning stage; BUT without someone stepping forward to lead this effort it could be that we have to forget about CVCC participation in Field Day for 2010. RANDOM SKIP DE W4DR

For a mountain climber the ultimate achievement is to reach the summit of Mt. Everest. For a HF DX'er in the Eastern US the ultimate QSO is to work Zone 23 on 160 meters. To begin with the path is 3 degrees North right through the middle of the auroral zone which is where low frequency signals die. The second problem is that there is only one amateur in Mongolia with a setup, which could penetrate that auroral zone under the most favorable conditions. For the past several years, Chak has almost never visited 160 and when he did it wasn't during our short period of common darkness.

In 2000 Ken, K4ZW raised money to purchase a Titanex 160 vertical for JT1CO. Chak and had it shipped to him. The next year Ken went over and tuned the antenna and put up some beverage receiving antennas. My hopes were high when he worked a half dozen East Coast big guns, but I wasn't one of the lucky ones. This was followed by a long period of inactivity. Several years ago Ken went back to Mongolia and operated from Chak's station in an attempt to penetrate the "death zone", but alas the Chinese Dragon (Over the Horizon Radar) was in full voice during Ken's entire visit making top band QSO's impossible.

Then during the ARRL 160 contest this year JT1CO was spotted near our sunrise. Sejo, N3UA was guest operating my station and stopped his run to listen carefully for him, but nothing heard. The next week I was up every morning around 11 GMT and on Thursday, December 10 a few East Coast stations made QSO's. I actually heard both ends of W8UVZ's QSO, but Chak was too weak to call. The next night I slept fitfully with dreams of working Mongolia. I was in the shack with my Command Tech 2500 warmed up by 11 GMT and immediately saw a spot for JT1CO on 1818. At first I didn't hear any thing and then clear as a bell I heard "de JT1CO qrz up 1". A 3x de W4DR brought a response that I thought might be me, but not readable so I sent "agn agn de W4DR". This time I heard "W4DR W4DR 559 BK". I responded and then heard a "CFM CFM". To make matters sweeter a few minutes later JT1CO sent me a "congratulations, Bob" on the Low Band chat room. By the end of the week Chak's logs were uploaded to LOTW and I had DXCC credit for the contact. I asked myself, did this really happen? I had hoped for this contact ever since I put up my 4 square array in 1996. That first year I worked 8Q7CW zone 22, UA0KAG zone 19 and XZ1N zone 26 to reach 39 zones. Thirteen years later I had decided I would never finish WAZ on top band. I guess the moral of this story is never say you can't do something.

Mea Culpa. Back in September I wrote about two calls which disappeared from the 160 DXCC listings. Although I did not know why this happened and said so, I made the mistake of giving the whole calls. I made the mistake of thinking our readership was mostly local. Much to my surprise one of the stations wrote to Puck and although we couldn't quite understand his message it was apparent that he was quite unhappy. Lesson learned, don't give calls when writing about strange happenings even if you are pretty sure you know the circumstances. At the Dayton Hamvention every year the DX banquet is a sold out event with over 300 DX'ers in attendance. One of the features is the DX Countdown. They have all DXCC members stand and then count by tens. When your number is reached you set down. By the time they reach 350 there aren't many standing and they go by fives and finally ones until one person is standing. Obviously the numbers above 338 is a function of how many deleted DX entities you have credited. Doing a little research on old QRZ records I determined that the #1 guy, K6ZO at 394 is 94 years old. There are 17 stations ahead of my 386 total and 13 of them are US stations. Their ages vary from 94 down to 79 and the 79 year old is the only one in his 70's. The average age of the group is 90. Of the overseas guys 4X4DK is my age, 74, SM3BIZ is 83. I could not determine the age of DJ2BW and I0AMU. So I figure if I keep going to Dayton ever year for the next ten years I have a chance of being the last one standing, but that wouldn't be as good as winning the top door prize which is usually a high priced transceiver.

Here and there. Ed isn't doing his regular DX column this month, but I do know that W4MYA took advantage of the good polar conditions by getting his first Zone 19 on 160 and he is gunning for Zones 23 and 24 to finish his WAZ. BU2AQ has been very active from Zone 24, but doesn't have much of a signal and only K1ZM and W4ZV have worked him from the east as far as I know. W1ZA was able to work 4S7NE on 40 SSB, a real catch. I had a shot at HV0A on 160 SSB, but couldn't break the huge European pileup.

Please up date your DX Totals on the CVCC web site between December 31 and January 15, 2010. It is hard to predict who the winner(s) may be, but I suspect it will be some new blood. In retrospect 2009 has been a great year for DX. As usual there have been some exciting DXpeditions. The increased use of LOTW has greatly reduced the cost of getting ARRL based awards. Online logs have helped us be sure that our QSO's were "in the log" and not with some pirate. The loss of a cw testing requirement has not caused the demise of cw nor ruined the ham bands as some predicted. Life is good!
