Go East (Left) on Huguenot Trail (Rt. 711) approx. 5.5 miles 2320 is on your Left and approx. 1 mile from Lee's Landing Road.

**Directions from Rt. 60 and Rt. 522

Go North on Rt. 522 to Rt. 711. Go East (Right) on Huguenot Trail (Rt. 711) approx. 5.5 miles.

2320 is on your Left and approx. one mile from Lee's Landing Road.

RANDOM SKIP DE W4DR

Recently I have written about the huge advantage Europeans have over North American stations in working for WAZ on 160 meters. Since there are only 40 zones to work the amount of years a station has been on the band is of much less importance than where they are located. When one looks at DXCC on 160 where there are 338 entities to work North Americans may have a slight advantage as the top scores for this award are slightly ahead of the top European scores, but the difference is rapidly diminishing.

This month I decided to do a little analysis of top 6-meter DXCC scores and attempt to "normalize" or handicap scores from Europe, Japan, North America and South America. I did this by averaging the top four DXCC scores from each continent and then comparing them. In the case of South America I could only use the top two scores as there were very few 6-meter awards from that continent. The results are as follows: Europe = 234, Japan = 204, South America = 196, North America = 168. Thus the average top NA scores are 66 below EU and represent 72% of their scores. Our average scores are 36 below JA or just 82% of theirs. Compared to SA we are down only 28 and our percentage rises to 86%. The JA's top scores are 87% of the EU scores and the top SA scores are down by 38 entities compared to EU and are 84% of their average. I know that PVRC has some formula to "normalize" contest scores for their awards. Perhaps the ARRL should consider this for their 6 meter DXCC. Why only 6 meters? If you look at the bands from 3.5 to 28 MHz it is possible to work the world from just about anywhere given enough time along with better than average antennas. Oh well, who said life was fair? It's a fun game no matter what the rules are.
